president of the prestigious Spanish Film Academy, as well as a producer in his own right. As president, he oversees the country's Goya Awards - a glittering night that has helped make the international careers of Spanish-language performers, directors and movies alike, from Antonio Banderas and Penélope Cruz to Pedro Almodóvar and Argentina's Oscar-winning The Secret in Their Eves. His list is international, with a hint of Spanish bias.

First up, he picked the French production designer and art director Alain Bainée, who created the look on films as diverse as Vicky Cristina Barcelona, The Machinist, and Fragile. He trained as an architect, then moved into advertising as an art director and, finally, movies, thanks to Pedro Almodóvar, who hired him for Kika. "Insanity is part of the foundations of this work," he explains. "If not, it's impossible to dream."

His second pick is a young actress from Madrid: Macarena García. She studied psychology at university before choosing the world of acting - using her childhood skills as a gymnast and her teenage love of dance to work in musicals. A few years in soap operas won her a healthy fan base, but it was getting the lead in Pablo Berger's 2012 hit Blancanieves (Snow White) that has pushed her to real stardom. She played the daughter of a bullfighter who takes up her father's trade after her stepmother kicks her out. The role won her a Goya for Best New Actress, and she has been tipped as a rising star of European cinema at the San Sebastián Film Festival.

Next, he moved to Mexico for the budding young talent, Tessa Ía González Norvind, daughter of the actress Nailea Norvind. Although just 18, she has already picked up local awards for her performance in Michel Franco's After Lucia, in which she played a schoolgirl trying to help her father come to terms with the death of his mother while she handles bullies at school. Franco drew on her life, and cast her friends in the film – a process Norvind found "harrowing, but rewarding".

Moving over to Paraguay, González Macho tipped the first-time feature directors Juan Carlos Maneglia and Tana Schémbori. The duo have always worked together – starting off on short films before moving into TV. Their 13-part telenovela González vs. Bonetti – originally broadcast on Paraguay's Channel 4 Telefuturo – topped the ratings on Hispanic channels in the USA and Canada. Their debut feature, 7 Boxes, about a young porter in a huge city market coming into contact with the mob, has been described as "The Fast and the Furious with wheelbarrows".

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Finally, he chose Benjamín Ávila, a screenwriter and director from Argentina. Ávila's work is often drawn from his bitter personal experience. His documentary *Nietos (Identidad y memorial) –* about the children of the 'disappeared' under the Argentinian junta of the late 1970s – led to his first feature, based on true events in his life. Infancia Clandestina (Clandestine Childhood), which took prizes at both the San Sebastián and Havana film festivals, is set in 1979. It's about a family of activists who work to overthrow the dictatorship under assumed identities, and is seen through the eyes of their young son, Juan. "It is a film that I made for my brothers," he says, "and for the children of the 'disappeared' and those killed during the last dictatorship in Argentina."

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
